



# Step-by-Step with Modern Masters

RECIPÉ N° 2 | Aged Warehouse Metallics

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This recipe is great to create a metallic finish for an industrial, warehouse look - with a bit of a polished vibe. The finish can be done with most of our [Matte Metallics](#) and [Metallic Paint](#) colors as well as on surfaces such as cabinetry, furniture, décor accents, and more.

#### PRODUCTS NEEDED

- Modern Masters [Furniture Glazing Cream](#)
- Modern Masters [Black Glazing Cream Color](#)
- Modern Masters [Nickel Metallic Paint](#)
- Modern Masters [MasterClear® Protective Clear Topcoat in Satin](#)


#### TOOLS NEEDED

- 2" and 4" Chip Brush
- Rags and Mixing Containers



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*TIP: Lightly sand and clean the surface to be painted. If the cabinets are already painted with a water base acrylic paint, head straight to Step 1. If the cabinets have a topcoat or an oil-based finish, we would recommend prepping the surface with a tinted or untinted bonding primer or paint, then start with Step 1. The cabinet door featured was painted with Benjamin Moore Waynesboro Taupe #1544 in Eggshell.*

**STEP 1:** Using the 4" chip brush (or a low nap roller on larger projects), apply Nickel Metallic Paint to the surface, making sure the door is covered. While still wet, soften out any brush strokes by lightly brushing over the door from top to bottom. When doing the final opaque coat, brush or roll in one direction for a uniform finish. Let dry.

**STEP 2:** Mix 1 oz. Black Glazing Cream Color with 1 cup Furniture Glazing Cream. Use the 2" chip brush to apply the mixture onto the entire door. Remove excess glaze by wiping surface with a soft dry rag. Allow for a uniform allover finish, leaving a slight build-up of glaze around the edges of the panel. Let dry. Protect with MasterClear® Protective Clear Topcoat in Satin.
